Grandparent Well, when I was your age, there was a virus in

the world and we had to stay at home for weeks. (The child gasps in disbelief and the grandparent nods) We couldn't go to the park and we had to

stay home to be safe.

Child What was it like? How did you manage? What

did you do? How did you feel? (Talking very quickly) WHAT HAPPENED? (Louder voice)

Grandparent Slow down! (Laughing) I can tell you all you want

to know. (Sounding happy) What would you like

to know first?


Maths

Focus:

Time – Read, Write Calculate and Convert Time on Analogue and Digital 12- and 24-Hour Clocks WALT: find unknown start or end times when duration is known

This problem was solved correctly in two different ways.


To find the finish time, or **end time**, of the match, time needs to be **added** to the time number line.



Look through the work you did two weeks ago on time to remind yourself how to solve time problems.

In this problem, the **start time** of the match needs to be found and it can be found in a similar way but looking **back** the number line, **taking time away**. A football match ended at 16.40 and played for one hour and 10 minutes. What

time did the match start?



ANSWER

16:40 – 10 minutes then – 1 hour = 15:30 OR 16:40 – 40 minutes then – 30 minutes = 15:30 (40+30=70minutes)

The problem can be solved in both of these ways.



History The Tudors

The Reformation



In Europe, during Tudor times, there was huge religious and political change.

Attempts were made to **reform** (change and improve) the Catholic Church.

This change is known as The Reformation.

The Catholic church and the leadership and authority of the Pope were challenged because people wanted to change the way it worked.

People split from the Catholic Church and the Reformation led to the development of Protestant Churches (including the Church Of England, which was created by Henry VIII).

Henry VIII grew up as a Catholic. He believed so strongly in the Catholic religion, that he even wrote a bestselling book, about how important it is to be Catholic and to ignore people who want to change you.

Defence of the Seven Sacraments

So, WHY DID Henry change religion in England and Break from Rome?

There were FOUR reasons:

Love

Henry wanted to divorce Catherine of Aragon and marry Anne Boleyn. Divorce is only allowed in the Catholic Church, with special permission from the Pope. The Pope would not give Henry a divorce.

Henry thought Anne would give him a son. He wanted a male heir, to become King after him.

Power

Henry VIII fought many wars with France, Scotland, Italy and Ireland. This showed his power but cost him a lot of money.

Money

As head of the Church of England, many churches changed from being Catholic to being Protestant (Church of England). Everything those churches had then belonged to Henry. He got rich, as he sold their land and possessions and took all of their money every week. Religion.

Extra information about the Reformation will help you to understand this time in history.

As head of the Church of England, Henry would control and lead the church, giving him even more power and money.

RS3 Adviser Cards

As Head of the Church, Henry would gain power and status here and abroad.

God might punish Henry, all us advisers and even England if he takes this step against the Church.

Churches would pay taxes to the crown, not to the Pope in Rome. Henry would have more money to pay for wars and to defend England.

Henry would make enemies even here in England. They might start a war against him or help enemies from abroad.

If Henry could marry Anne, the baby she is expecting would rightfully become King after Henry, if it is a boy.

If Henry does not get a son, the Tudor line will die out.

Henry is short of money. If he becomes Head of the Church he could use some of the church's wealth.

Monks and clergymen (Bishops and priests etc) will disagree and might try and help Henry's enemies.

Some monks are greedy or corrupt (bad), Henry could close the monasteries, and get rid of them.

The monasteries look after the poor and sick, if they were closed who would carry on their work?

If we don't do what Henry wants we may lose our powerful jobs, or worse, our lives.

Catherine's uncle, the Holy Roman Emperor, Charles V, might send armies to attack England if this goes ahead.

The Bible says a man must not marry his brother's wife so Henry and Catherine's marriage is wrong. This will right the wrong.

The Church accepted Catherine's marriage to Henry, even though she had been married to his brother before.

God has cursed Henry's marriage to Catherine because it is wrong. Look how many of their babies have died.

Protestants are 'heretics', that means they will go to Hell. We could all go to Hell if we agree to this.

Henry will be able to marry Anne, whom he loves.

Catherine loves Henry and has been a good wife to him. She does not deserve

If Henry stays with Catherine, her daughter, Mary will be the only true heir to the throne. A mere woman cannot rule
