

One by one, her friends crept back into the forest.


And by spring, new shoots of life were peeping up through the carpet of ash on the forest floor.

When she was over the fire, she tipped her wings to release the droplets of water. The water hissed and fizzed away in the flames in an instant.








She flew back to the stream again and again, wetting her wings and returning to the burning forest, sprinkling the drops of water from her wing onto the fire, where they always fizzled out...



...and the fire was burning closer and closer to her tree.






Up in the heavens, the gods looked down and laughed at the little bird's hopeless quest to save her home.

How did the bird feel when she noticed her home was on fire?








More animals live in forests than anywhere else in the world.




There are around 10,000 different species of bird worldwide.






Birds have hollow bones which makes flying much easier. Scientists believe that humans began using fire to cook food around 1 million years ago.








#### **Story sequence cards**

Can you change the order to make a silly story?






















#### Beak Pick Up




Birds don't have hands; they have to use their beaks to pick things up!

If someone catches on fire, they should stop what they're doing, drop down to lie on the floor and roll around to put the fire out.



All you need for this game is one bucket or bowl of water and another empty bucket or bowl.

Using whatever you can find, try to get the water from one bowl to another. You can't pick up either of the buckets!


Try using your hands, sponges, cups, etc. Which is the best water transporter?







Can you move to and from your safe place like the bird did in the story?

#### Bird bath

#### You will need:

- An old shallow bowl or plate that you no longer need—or find one in a charity shop.
- Water (you can use tap water or wait for a rainy day!)

Some stones—see what you can collect.



Line the shallow bowl or plate with the stones you have collected. These attract the birds and give them somewhere to stand without falling in the water!

Place the bowl or plate outside somewhere that the birds can go, ideally out of the reach of cats.

Then, fill the bowl or plate with water—or you can wait for the rain to do the work for you.



Enjoy watching your feathery visitors!



If you have a cat, make sure it wears a bell so that the birds know to fly away!





Go for a walk in the park to collect leaves and twigs.
Can you make a bird's nest out of them?



Birds collect lots of different items to make their nests warm and comfortable. What makes your home comfortable?
