RHE

- Majority of parents support RHE.
- Some parents say that RHE was the responsibility of parents, and that they welcome the right they have (enshrined in current law) to withdraw their child from Sex education lessons
- Most of the young people disagreed, stressing that their parents have not in fact taught them!
- Many parents/carers don't discuss RHE as much as they wish to!

Why is RHE important?

- Research show that effective, honest, well-delivered sex and relationship education:
 - Delays a young person's first experience of sex
 - Means they have fewer sexual partners
 - Reduces the chance of teenage pregnancy.
 - Abstinence only sex education programmes are not proved effective in these areas.

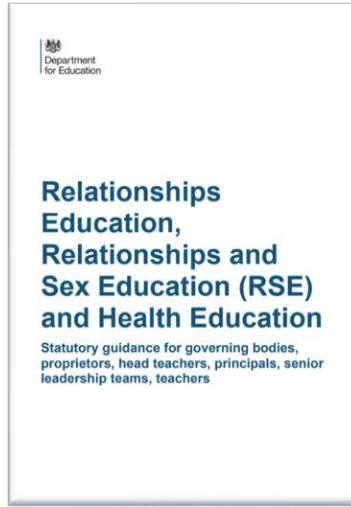

Statutory RHE



This July, 2025, the Department for Education published new statutory guidance for Relationships, Sex and Health Education (RSHE). These updated requirements will become **statutory in September 2026**, and until then, the current 2019 guidelines (above) remain in effect.

Ten Ten Resources are already working behind the scenes to update the Life to the Full programme so that our curriculum remains compliant, high-quality and faithful to a Catholic understanding of the human person.

What is changing?

The new guidance builds on the 2019 curriculum and introduces some new areas of focus. Below outlines key changes relevant to primary schools:

Topic	Primary Schools
Mental Health & Wellbeing	Adds emotional regulation, grief and bereavement
Relationships & Families	Stronger encouragement to include same-sex families
Gender & Identity	Factual teaching on sex and gender reassignment law; age-appropriate
Online Safety	Optional content on online harms, where age-appropriate
Physical Health & Safety	Adds safety content: fire, water, road, rail
Health & Puberty	Confirms anatomical language for safeguarding

Tenten will continue to liaise with diocesan education offices to ensure their updates align with local and national expectations.

Primary Relationships Education

Relationships Education will put in place the building blocks needed for positive and safe relationships, including with family, friends and online.

2

Your child will be taught what a relationship is, what friendship is, what family means and who can support them.

3

In an age-appropriate way, our school will cover how to treat each other with kindness, consideration and respect.

By the end of their time primary school, your child will have been taught content on:

- families and people who care for me
- caring friendships
- respectful relationships
- online relationships
- being safe

Health Education aims to give your child the information they need to make good decisions about their own health and wellbeing, to recognise issues in themselves and others, and to seek support as early as possible when issues arise.

(The science curriculum in all primary schools also includes content on human development, including reproduction, which there is no right to withdraw from.)

Secondary Relationships and Sex Education

Relationships and Sex Education will build on the teaching at primary. It aims to give young people the information they need to help them develop healthy, nurturing relationships of all kinds.

Your child's school will cover content on what healthy and unhealthy relationships look like and what makes a good friend, colleague and successful marriage or committed relationship. At the appropriate time, the focus will move to developing intimate relationships, to equip your child with knowledge they need to make safe, informed and healthy choices as they progress through adult life.

By the end of secondary school, pupils will have been taught content on:

- families
- respectful relationships, including friendships
- online media
- being safe
- intimate and sexual relationships, including sexual health

None of these educational goals are possible if RHE is not given the time and importance it deserves by those who plan and implement its delivery in school. RHE must be taken seriously by school leaders; led properly by someone who has the time and expertise to co-ordinate the subject with dedication and commitment at a senior level; taught by those committed to doing it well; taught as part of a whole-school approach by those who are able to celebrate – not merely tolerate – the teaching of the Church on love and human sexuality.

Model Curricula

- A model RSE Curriculum for Primary

Three themes:

- Created and loved by God
- Created to love others
- Created to live in community

Created and loved by God

The Christian imperative to love self, made in the image and likeness of God, shows an understanding of the importance of valuing and understanding oneself as the basis for personal relationships.

- Education in virtue
- Religious understanding of the human person: loving myself.
- Me, my body and my health
- Emotional wellbeing and attitudes
- Life cycles and fertility

Created to love others

God is love. We are created out of love and for love. The command to love is the basis of all Christian morality

- Education in virtue
- Religious understanding of human relationships: Loving others
- Personal Relationships
- Keeping Safe and People Who Can Help Me

Created to live in community

Human beings are relational by nature and live in the wider community. Through our exchange with others, our mutual service and through dialogue, we attempt to proclaim and extend the Kingdom of God for the good of individuals and the good of society.

- Education in virtue
- Religious understanding of the importance human communities
- Living in the wider world

Education in Virtue

Each theme begins with a statement of the virtues which are necessary to living well in relationship with others and these virtues **should underpin the teach habits which are learned from experiencing but also should emerge as a consequence of it**. Virtues are gained through imitation, the same virtues being **modelled by those who teach**. They express the qualities of character that schools **should seek to develop in their pupils**, through their exemplification by the whole community of which the pupils are a part. These virtues reflect our Christian tradition but they are also, of course, fundamental human virtues which are universally shared

Who is responsible for the teaching of RSE? Parents and carers

"Sex education, which is a basic right and duty of parents, must always be carried out under their attentive guidance, whether at home or in educational centres chosen and controlled by them. In this regard, the Church reaffirms the law of subsidiarity, which the school is bound to observe when it cooperates in sex education, by entering into the same spirit that animates the parents"¹

Parents are the first educators of their children. It is their right and responsibility to inform and educate their children in matters relating to human growth and development, particularly sexual development. Therefore, schools should always seek to work in partnership with parents and carers and the teaching offered by schools should complement and not replace their primary role. The Church has a special duty and right to educate as part of its mission, and a Catholic school is the principal means by which it assists parents in their duties.

This principle that parents are the first educators of children is sometimes used as a reason for not including sexual education in school curriculums, or for excluding the elements which deal with puberty and sexual behaviour. However, the principle is a general educational principle – not one that is specific to sexual education². Given that the education process is one of partnership between parents and educators this area too must be taught in school if the parents have sought this partnership in education by electing to send their child to a Catholic school. A Catholic school can no more avoid its responsibilities in this regard than can good Christian parents. The Church's emphasis that parents are the first teachers of their children, includes the recognition that parents will need and welcome help to teach their children about love, relationships and sexuality.³

Partnership with parents

- Primary educators of children

DfE- Parents rights

The important lessons you teach your child about healthy relationships, looking after themselves and staying safe, are respected and valued under this new curriculum.

Teaching at school will complement and reinforce the lessons you teach your child as they grow up.

The school is required to consult with you when developing and renewing their policies on Relationships Education. These policies must be published online and be available to anybody free of charge.

Schools are required to ensure their teaching reflects the age and religious background of their pupils.



DfE - Right to withdraw your child- Primary

You cannot withdraw your child from Relationships Education because it is important that all children receive this content, covering topics such as friendships and how to stay safe.

Your child's primary school can choose to teach Sex Education. If you'd like to know more about this, we recommend speaking to the school to understand what will be taught and when. If you do not want your child to take part in some or all of the lessons on Sex Education, you can ask that they are withdrawn. At primary level, the head teacher must grant this request.

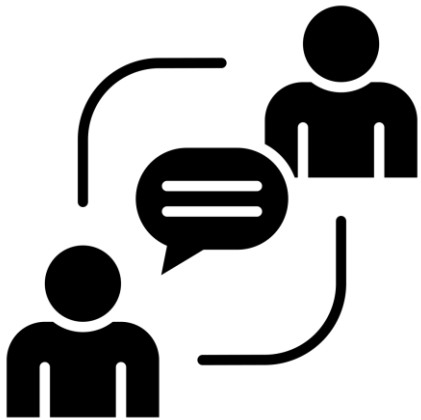
Parent Consultation

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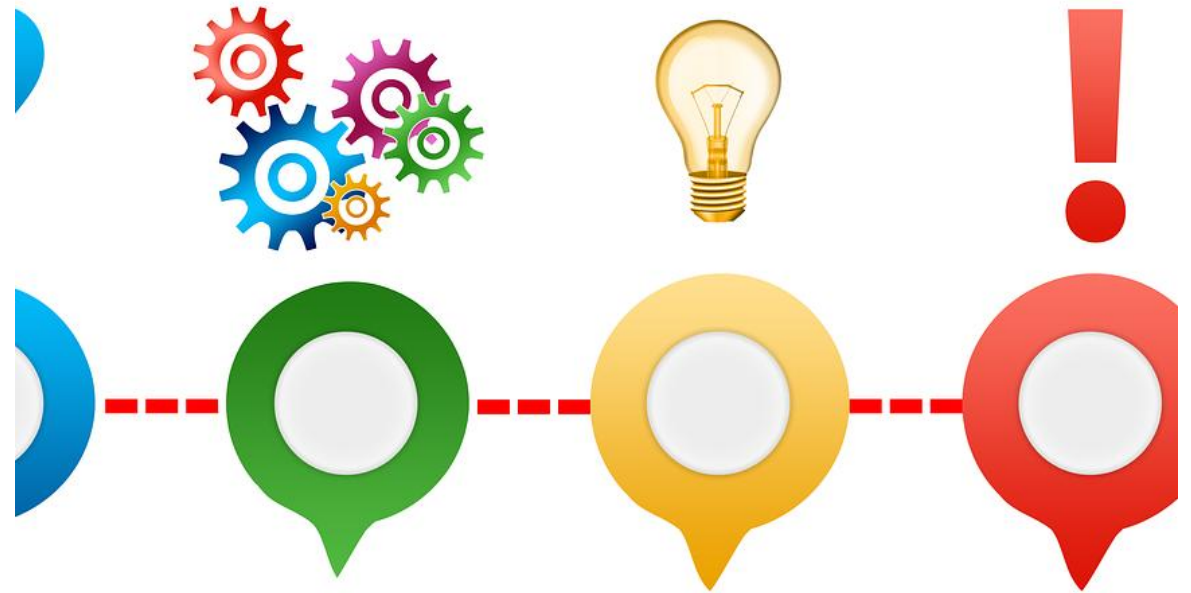
